As we close out our 60th year in 2025, we reflect on one of our most impactful and transformative years yet, made possible by the generosity of supporters like you.

Our team has worked tirelessly to turn your support into meaningful achievements that expand access to nature and outdoor learning. Our new Community Outreach and Volunteer Coordinator Kristen Buck has connected with communities across Maine, attending dozens of outreach events that introduce more people to the wonders of nature. Program Director Brianna Guy reached hundreds of children this year through day camps and school field trips, led citizen science activities, guided paddles and walks, and served as our Traveling Naturalist, bringing environmental education directly to schools and community groups. Refuge Manager Howard Corbett has improved trails, bridged wet areas, maintained gear and facilities, and collaborated with University of Maine Construction Engineering Technology students to build a large screened pavilion, tripling the Refuge's capacity for outdoor programs.

These dedicated staff members, and the many others behind the scenes, bring Hirundo's mission to life every day, connecting people with nature in meaningful ways.



Accessibility Trail Evaluation

- Ty Perkins, a Husson University intern, conducted a detailed accessibility assessment of Hirundo's trails to support hikers who are deaf, lowvision/blind, or have other physical disabilities.
- His evaluation covered slope, width, terrain, surface type, and rest areas.
- Work completed includes trail updated descriptions, photos, signage, guide ropes with reflectors (pictured here), and example videos providing a foundation for accessible visitor engagement and informing upcoming upgrades.
 - True accessibility in nature requires both physical improvements and a cultural shift in how we think about who belongs outdoors.

BUILDING STRENGTH THROUGH COLLABORATION

Screened Pavilion / Outdoor Classroom



- The new screened pavilion will hold 30-40 people, expanding Hirundo's outdoor classroom capacity from 12-15.
- Built in collaboration with University of Maine Construction
 Engineering and Technology students and funded by Bangor
 GreenDrinks and the Old Town-Orono Rotary Club and the
 Bangor Breakfast Rotary Club, the pavilion also includes
 picnic tables constructed by Central High School students.
- A plaque will honor all contributors who made this facility improvement possible.

Earth Day Celebration

- Hirundo's annual Meet a Scientist event brought a dozen University of Maine scientists to share interactive displays with families.
- Heavy rain led to a last-minute move indoors at the Indian Island Bingo Palace, thanks to the generosity of Penobscot Community.
- The event successfully connected the public with science and nature in a collaborative setting.






Hirundofest






INVESTING IN ACCESS TO NATURE

CELEBRATING WITH A RIBBON-CUTTING

We will hold a ribbon-cutting for the new screened pavilion this spring with activities and refreshments. The pavilion will then host Hirundo programs and be available for private rentals.

INVESTING IN KIDS IN NATURE

We will offer \$1,500 in camp scholarships, giving more youth a hands-on outdoor experience.

ENHANCING OUR FACILITIES

We will increase Hirundo's facility capabilities with an additional solar battery, water catchment system, and other improvements.

BUILDING NEW PARTNERSHIPS

We will partner with more local businesses, schools, and organizations, co-hosting events, coordinating promotions, and linking field trips to classroom lessons to expand outdoor learning.

EXPANDING OPPORTUNITIES TO GIVE

We will bring back the fall raffle with earlier ticket sales, allow supporters to honor loved ones with memorial bench plaques, and consider a memorial walkway.

We will advance strategic planning to guide Hirundo toward becoming a leading educational center for the region.
